

Sun Safety During Summer Months

Atlanta 2007/05/31 -Len Lichtenfeld, MD, deputy chief medical officer for the American Cancer Society, recently spoke to radio stations about the importance of practicing sun safety. Dr. Lichtenfeld addressed results from a Society study that found that intense ultraviolet (UV) exposure remains common in adolescents despite extensive skin cancer prevention messages, and evidence that excessive sun exposure in childhood contributes to the risk of skin cancers later in life. He also highlighted the Society's Slip! Slop! Slap! message—Slip on a shirt, Slop on sunscreen (SPF 30 or higher) and Slap on a hat.
